

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About tonight's programme

The solemn season of Lent provides an opportunity for reflection and introspection as we move towards Holy Week and the celebration of Easter. Our programme this evening features sacred music spanning more than four hundred years, from the masters of the Renaissance in Tallis and Palestrina all the way to contemporary British composers of two more recent generations in Bob Chilcott and Philip Stopford.

Perhaps the centrepiece of the programme is the pair of Mass movements from the Liechtensteiner organist-composer Josef Rheinberger. This work for double choir is traditional, in the direct lineage of the music of (more-or-less) contemporaries, such as Mendelssohn and Brahms, their great influence, Bach, and all the way back to the antiphonal choral writing that had sprung up in Venice two centuries before. And yet it is also novel, with a textural, dynamic, and harmonic freedom that marks it as a reaction against the burgeoning Cecilian movement in Roman Catholic music that called for liturgical music to exist only as far as it serves the text, favouring the simple, syllabic style of medieval chant.

The *Kyrie* and *Agnus Dei*, the first and last movements of the Mass respectively, are rich, complex, and above all warm, the music and familiar text in happy balance.

Either side of this cornerstone, our programme winds through some of the great favourites of the sacred choral repertoire, bookended by two of the simplest and yet most effective anthems, written some three hundred years apart, both of which draw their text from St John's Gospel, the concert beginning with Thomas Tallis's *If ye love me* and ending with Sir John Stainer's sublime setting of *God so loved the world*, from his famous oratorio *The Crucifixion*.

Other treats lie in store: the serene *Sicut cervus*, Palestrina's setting of the first verse of Psalm 42, "Like as the hart desireth the water brook, so thirsteth my soul after thee, O God." Palestrina's counterpoint flows as inevitably as the brook itself, drawing singer and listener alike onwards, ever onwards.

We feel the moment of repose in Palestrina's divine final cadence, but we know our journey is not complete: we must yet travel with Christ to Jerusalem, to Gethsemane, to the cross – to Easter, and to resurrection.
