About this afternoon's programme

Our programme today takes you on a journey through over four centuries of choral and vocal music, exploring how composers across eras have expressed love, longing, joy, and reflection.

We open with lively English madrigals of the late Renaissance, including Farmer's playful *Fair Phyllis I saw*, Bennet's poignant *Weep*, *O mine eyes*, and Morley's evergreen celebration of spring, *Now is the month of Maying*. These works, with their intricate word-painting and buoyant rhythms, contrast with the contemplative beauty of Orlando Gibbons' *The Silver Swan* – a miniature masterpiece of melancholy.

Two songs by John Dowland, renowned for his bittersweet lute songs, continue the theme of love's joys and sorrows.

From here, we move into the Romantic era with Johannes Brahms' richly harmonised partsongs, which combine folk-inspired lyricism with warm, expressive textures. These are followed by a selection from Sir Hubert Parry's *Songs of Farewell*, where the English choral tradition meets profound spiritual introspection, and two of Gustav Holst's delicate *Five Partsongs*, which paint dreamlike and pastoral scenes.

Finzi's *Till Earth Outwears*, with its sensitivity to poetry, bridges Romanticism and 20th-century modernism, while Matyas Seiber's *Three Hungarian Folk-songs* bring vibrant folk rhythms and harmonies to life.

The final section celebrates the golden age of 20th-century song and musical theatre. From the tender lyricism of *When I Fall in Love* to the timeless charm of *The Way You Look Tonight*, the heartfelt *What I Did for Love*, and Rodgers' exuberant *My Favourite Things*, this closing set shows how the spirit of song continues to evolve while remaining rooted in melody, story, and emotion.
